The History program expects that 90% of majors should meet or exceed goal 1a.</p>	<p>Reporting Period: 2018 - 2019</p> <p>Conclusion: Did Not Meet Expectations</p> <p>During the 2017-2018 academic years, a total of 26 students enrolled in one of the four sections offered of HIS 4936 (two in the fall and two in the spring). In 2018-2019, 23 of 26 (88%) students met or exceeded goal 1a. (04/23/2019)</p>	<p>Use of Findings: After a careful review of this year's findings, department members agreed that more emphasis needs to be placed on introducing students to a basic narrative of the material covered. HIS 4936 classes are variable topics courses and many students enroll without having any background in the particular topic. (06/14/2019)</p>

In 2018-2019, 22 of 26 (85%) students met or exceeded goal 1b. (06/14/2019)</p>	<p>Use of Findings: We expect that 90% our majors will be able to conduct advanced historical research. This year's assessment figures represent a significant drop from last year and will need to be addressed in 2019-2020. One of the strategies we discussed was to place more emphasis on locating and citing primary and secondary sources in all of our courses, not just the Methods class (HIS 3002). (06/14/2019)</p>

(06/14/2019)</p>	<p>Use of Findings: Over the past two years, we have placed a renewed emphasis on working with students to enhance their oral communication skills. Oral presentations have been implemented in many of our 3000-level courses and it is a mandatory assignment in HIS 3002, our required Methods course. We are heartened by this year's assessment of oral presentation skills and we will continue to promote this skill in our program. (06/14/2019)</p>

The ability to analyze and explain complex historical data is a critical skill, one that can transfer to so many other disciplines and professional fields. For that reason, our program stresses this skill at every level of the curriculum. (06/15/2019)</p>

(06/15/2019)</p>	<p>Use of Findings: The 2018-2019 assessment of this particular critical thinking skill indicates that students continue to struggle with their ability to demonstrate awareness of competing historical narratives and relevant scholarly debates. As a program, we hope that this skill will improve with the creation of our new required Methods course. At our first meeting in the fall of 2019, we intend to discuss other potential strategies to improve student outcomes in this (and all other) program outcomes. (06/15/2019)</p>
