Summary Statement – Academic Program Performance in 2012-13

Provide a summary statement about academic program performance over the previous year including high points and low points.

ISS students continue to largely meet our goals for performance on the student learning outcomes. We continue to make changes to our program in order to increase the academic excellence of our students. This past year, we submitted substantial changes to the ISS program to meet our goals of having greater control over our students' courses and learning. For example, we have made changes to the methods requirement by expanding it to include a variety of discipline specific and qualitative methods courses in addition to the traditional statistics course. We have created our own qualitative methods course, designed and taught by Dr. Johns Krishnaswami, and continue to recruit ISS majors into this course. This allows us to track student performance in research methods. We have also updated the courses available to our students in the different concentration areas, in concert with the program coordinators or chairs of the associated disciplines. We eliminated outdated concentration areas, such as Sociology, in which we cannot provide adequate coursework for our students. We hope to be able to reinstitute a Sociology concentration once we hire a sociologist for our campus. This should be an integral part of any ISS degree program, and it is disappointing to us and to our students that we cannot offer the Sociology concentration at this time. We also culled courses that were not clearly social science courses (such as literature courses) in order to make each concentration area a more coherent and logical sequence of courses. This coming year, we will be making additional changes to our concentration areas to eliminate unnecessary overlap between discrete areas.

An additional change has to do with ISS 3013. Drs. Krishnaswami and Gaskin-Butler have been collaborating on this key gateway course. In an effort to have greater control over our students' preparedness for graduation, and for the rigors of the senior seminar, Dr. Krishnaswami instituted a

research paper in ISS 3013. This assignment uses similar steps to the longer and more complex senior paper, such as an annotated bibliography and multiple drafts, and a formal oral presentation. It is important that our students begin the process of learning to write formal, analytic papers in the discourse of their chosen concentration disciplines, BEFORE they arrive in the senior seminar. Dr. Krishnaswami will be teaching the ISS 3013 course every semester starting in Spring 2014 as Dr. Gaskin-Butler takes on additional courses in Psychology.

It is our goal to continue to increase students' written and oral communication skills, as well as their ability to think analytically, and to engage with the scientific discourse community. We will continue to expand our efforts to involve students in the local community, both through the Social Work internship and community based projects in Qualitative Methods.

In 2013-2014, we will be expanding our civic engagement component through the addition of community-based research projects in ISS 3930 Qualitative Methods and ISS 3013 Introduction to Social Science.

Summary Statement – Impact of Changes Made in 2012-13

Introduction of a major writing assignment in ISS 3013 has had positive impacts. Students were able to familiarize themselves with the research process, the library and its electronic data bases and journals, and to begin working on scholarly writing. The changes to this class also allowed Dr. Krishnaswami to identify ISS majors who may need additional assistance in order to be prepared for the senior paper by the time they enroll in ISS 4935.

This spring, Dr. Krishnaswami completed a graduate level course in the teaching of writing. This course was extremely useful to her in revising and implementing changes to writing assignments in ISS 3013. Dr. Krishnaswami intends to apply her new understanding of the latest research in composition pedagogy to the senior seminar in Spring 2014. She is currently revising her syllabus for that course to incorporate the latest findings in composition research.

Students have responded positively to the more flexible research methods requirement in ISS. This has been especially beneficial for some of our students who have math learning disabilities.

Over the past year, Dr. Krishnaswami updated the ISS website and bulletin boards. She also acquired the use of the glass case in the middle of the second floor southern hall in Davis for ISS. Updated information about the major, courses, and students and faculty achievements are now on display. ISS faculty and students have regularly attended on campus open house events to increase recruitment of students to the ISS program.

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In ISS 4935, Senior Seminar, Dr. Schmidt made the following changes:

Based on previous student performance, some higher expectations were introduced to the capstone seminar assignments:

- 1) The annotated bibliography minimum requirements were increased from five sources to seven
- 2) Draft #1 from 4 pages to 6 pp
- 3) Draft #2 from 8 pages to 10 pp
- 4) Sources for the final paper: from 10 to 12 minimum
- 5) Weight of final paper was increased: from 350 to 400 points

The majority of students responded well (four A+; three A; three A-; one B; three B-; two C+; one C-
